The park will be a way for dogs to get more exercise and for their owners to31 Caroline Huggins walks her dog32 what will soon be Charlotte's first 2-acre dog park. "We're just trying to raise enough money for the fence, need about 10,000 more dollars. If we could get that, it would be open now," said Huggins.
